Suggestions for Promoting Your CLP Credential

Be Recognized for your Achievement

Display & Use the CLP Credential Every Day

- Introduce yourself as a "Certified Licensing Professional" to your colleagues and clients.
- Update your business cards and other professional collateral with the CLP credential (using the guidelines available online at www.licensingcertification.org). Please note that the letters "CLP" should appear in a font no larger than the name of the individual and the name of his/her employer.
- Frame and hang your CLP certificate in your office.

Advance your Career

- Update your resume or CV with the CLP credential.
- Inform your employer and human resources representative of your achievement.
- Ensure a copy of your certificate and requirements to maintain the CLP credential is in your personnel file for future evaluations and promotions.

Share your Knowledge and Mentor New CLP Certificants

- Mentor a colleague or professional associate interested in the CLP certification.
- Volunteer to serve on a CLP committee.
- Educate your colleagues on the value of the CLP credential by discussing it at industry events such as annual meetings/conferences, chapter meetings, educational offerings, etc.
